"Aaroh Tamso Jyoti"-May we rise from darkness to light, i.e. from ignorance to knowledge-the motto of 'Centre of Excellence', Government College, Sanjauli, Shimla - 6 compels one to halt at its portals and ruminate on the value-oriented education being imparted by this premier institution of Shimla. The college enjoys the distinct position of not only being the first Degree College to have been set up in Shimla in 1969, but also the first college to have been conferred with the status of 'Centre of Excellence' in 2006. Its ideal locale with lush green cedars and oaks add to the ambience required for chiseling the personality of youngsters who are yet to carve a niche for themselves in the competitive world. Situated at a distance of about 2kms. from The Ridge, it is easily accessible from Sanjauli, Lakkar Bazaar and Circular Road.

The Institute takes pride in its rich history and heritage. The imposing structure of the main building, currently housing Administrative Block and Computer Laboratories reminds one of the days of yore, when the jungle of concrete buildings had not defaced the Queen of Hills. The college was constructed way back in April 1869 by Harriet Christina Tytler as an institution for industrial orphanage under name of Himalayan Christina Orphanage and named as North Stoneham. Later in 1872, the same institution was reconstituted as the Mayo Industrial School for female orphans and other girls of European extraction. However, later it was rebuilt at a grand cost of Rs. 73545/- and was opened for use on March 1, 1905 during the Lieutenant-Governorship of Sir Charles Rivoz, K.C.S.I., and the Episcopate of the Reverend George Alfred Lefroy, D.D., the third Bishop Of Lahore. The structure was designed by the Architect A. Gaddock Esq. and built by the builder, Messrs. Rivertt and Sons. After independence, this institution was converted into a B.Ed/B.T. college for girls affiliated to Panjab University, till it attained its present position.

The college is undoubtedly making rapid strides in the field of education which is implicit from the fact that it is running three streams-Arts, Science & Commerce, besides an undergraduate course in Computer Applications. However, B.Com. and B.C.A. courses were started in 2006. The B.C.A. course is being run under the self-financing scheme. The course of Computer Application is available in Non-Medical stream, in place of Chemistry, to thirty students selected on the basis of merit. The course of Computer Application is sponsored by the U.G.C. under the self-financing scheme. In Arts faculty thirteen subjects are being taught in this college. However, it is to be noted that there are limited seats available in each course and selection is based purely on the merit basis. During the academic session 2010-11, there were 1675 students in this college — 712 students in first year, 561 in second year and 402 in final year class.

Classes are to commence from 23rd June, 2011 irrespective of the declaration of results. However, for the students seeking admission to second and final year classes, admission is based on roll-on system, if the result are not declared.

Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) – Study Centre (Code No.1101) at the Govt. College Sanjauli, Shimla-6, was established in 1986. It was the first study centre of the IGNOU which offered two study programmes initially viz BPD(BA) and MBA, with a strength of about 50 students. Today, more than 975 students are registered in over 69 different study programmes.

The new boys hostel with a facility for housing 100 students is fully functional since July 2010 onwards and it is located across the road.

It is mandatory for every student to be a member of the Sanchayika Scheme. The amount is refundable after completion of courses or when student leaves the College. (Original fee receipt required at the time of refund).

It is mandatory for every student to carry his/her College identity card while in College. The identity card will have to be produced by the student whenever it is demanded by the College authorities. Replacement of Photo in the Identity Card is not permitted under any circumstances whatsoever. In case the identity card is lost, a duplicate identity card will be issued on the payment of **Rs. 20/-** (within one week only).

1. It is compulsory for all the students to get their leave sanctioned before proceeding on any kind of leave.
2. For leave on medical grounds, the student will be required to submit a medical certificate in case the leave is for more than a week's duration.
3. Leave upto one week will be sanctioned by the concerned committee. For leave of more than one week's duration, the student shall have to apply to the principal.
4. A student will not be allowed to avail of more than 10 days leave during the entire academic session, excepting under exceptional circumstances.
6. Even if a student is on leave, he/she will have to deposit his/her fee as per the scheduled dates decided by the College.

Notification No. 6-38/2005- (SUG)-HPU (Acad)/- Dated : 4th June 2007

There shall be component of internal assessment in all undergraduate (Honours and Pass) degree courses except those specified for exclusion. The scheme for Internal Assessment shall be as follows :

1. a) 20% of the maximum marks in each paper for internal assessment.
b) Remaining 80% for the University examination. Time duration and other aspects of the existing scheme of examination to remain unchanged.

- a) 15% for house examination.
b) 5% for regularity in attendance.

- a) House Examination shall be conducted by each college for all courses where annual examination are held.
b) Ordinarily around two thirds of the syllabus should have been covered for the purpose of this House Examination.
c) The House Examination shall follow the same format as that of the University Examination in all respects including the format of question papers, the time duration for each paper, maximum marks allotted to each paper.
d) The marks obtained shall be scaled down to 15%. If there are fractions in the marks obtained in any paper as a result of the scaling down or otherwise, these shall be carried as such and shall not be converted into whole numbers. Conversion of fractions into whole number shall be done at the final stage of calculating internal assessment.
e) The scripts of the House Examination shall be shown to the students and collected back during the same teaching period.
f) Every teacher shall submit the results of the House Examination (showing the actual marks obtained as well as scaled down marks) as well as the answer scripts to the college office immediately after the scripts have been shown to the students. The teacher concerned shall maintain a copy of the record of marks with him/her.
g) a proper record of the question paper, answer scripts and marks sheets shall be kept by the college till the result of the university examination is declared. The University reserves the right to call for and scrutinize some/all scripts of any paper during this period make changes in the marks if found necessary.
h) In case where a paper consists of both a theory and a practical component, the House Examination part of the internal assessment programme shall apply only to theory component . Thus, for example, where a paper has 60 marks for theory and 40 marks for practical, the 40 marks shall continue to be assessed as per existing provisions, while 15% of the 60 marks i.e. 9 marks shall be provided as internal assessment on the basis of performance in House Examination and the remaining 3 marks shall be provided on the basis of attendance as provided in 4 (a), the remaining 48 marks shall be provided for the university examination

i.e. question paper will be set for 48 marks by the examiner.

- b) Credit for attendance shall be given for :
- Actual lectures and practical attended.
 - Attendance given by the Principal for representing the College/University/State in duly accredited sports extra-curricular activities for the actual days of participation.
- c) In subjects involving practical, attendance shall be calculated on the basis of lectures and practical taken together. Where one practical class covers three periods it will be counted as one unit.
- d) The attendance record of every student shall be displayed on the college notice board within a week of the end of each term. At the end of the third term the attendance of every student in each paper shall be summed up, converted into percentage and marks allotted according to the scale given above.
5. At the end of the term examination, the marks scored by every student in the House Examination in each paper (after appropriate scaling down to correspond to 15%) will be added to the marks allotted for attendance and the same shall be displayed on the college notice board. A period of one week shall be given to the students for pointing out discrepancies if any, after which the same shall be sent to the Controller of Examinations.
6. For the purpose of determining eligibility to sit for the university examination the existing provisions in the Ordinances shall continue to be followed as such.
7. If a college fails to submit the internal assessment marks by 10th March, the University shall not declare the results of that class in that college for which the responsibility shall rest solely with the college concerned.
8. In the case of students who repeat one or more papers, the internal assessment marks shall be carried forward.
9. Students who migrate from non-formal streams (like correspondence courses) to a regular college shall carry as such the marks obtained by him/her in the preceding year/s.
10. In exceptional cases not covered by the above, a student shall be awarded internal assessment marks (for previous year papers) in the same proportion as the marks obtained in that paper in the university examination. This shall be done by the Examination Branch in the University and not by the college.
11. With the introduction of the Internal Assessment scheme the maximum marks for the University Examination in each paper shall stand reduced as follows :-

For a 100 marks paper : University Examination 80 marks; I.A. 20 marks

For a 75 marks paper : University Examination 60 marks; I.A. 15 marks

For a 50 marks paper : University Examination 40 marks; I.A. 10 marks

Students will be divided into different tutorial groups for the purpose of academic excellence and greater interaction between the teacher and the taught. Teacher-in-charge of each group will provide assistance regarding academics and other activities periodically.

The College has very active and well-organized units of the NCC and the NSS whose activities are spearheaded by teachers with long experience in their respective fields.

The College Calendar gives great importance to various activities in sports. We have the proud privilege of representing the University and the State in many National and Zonal level sports competition. The College also has a good Gymnasium facility for sports persons.

College is going to introduce Rovers & Rangers activities from this session onwards under the leadership of (i) Dr. Pushpa Negi for Girls (ii) Prof. Madan Lal Shandil for Boys.

There are various provisions to grant scholarships of various categories to the deserving students as per the rules/directions issued by the state government from time to time. The few important categories are as follows : 1. IRDP, 2. SC/ST — it is restricted to certain income level as applicable by the order of H. P. Govt. and 3. Brilliant students scholarship of H.P.—This scholarship is available only for those students who fulfil the following requirements :

- i) He/she should be bonafied resident of Himachal Pradesh.
- ii) He/she should have passed plus two from H.P. Board
- iii) He/she should have secured minimum 77% marks at plus two level.
- iv) He/she should have secured minimum 60% marks at TDCI or II as applicable.

It is formed to help the students in providing the information for the selection of career and job placement through various Govt. and Private agencies, and to arrange the lectures by the experts and concerned officials for selection of better & suitable career.

The College publishes its magazine HIM RASHMI annually which provides a forum to the students with a flair for writing. It gives vent to their thoughts and perceptions.

College is member of the Project "National Library and Information Services Infrastructure for Scholarly Content (N-LIST)", being jointly executed by the UGC-INFONET Digital Library Consortium, INFLIBNET Centre and the INDEST-AICTE Consortium, IIT Delhi. This project provides free access to a collection of more than 76000 full text e-books and more than 2000 e-journals on all the subjects to students, researchers and faculty members. Many new academic e-resources are added to this facility nearly every month. Full text e-books can also be downloaded or printed directly from the publisher's website under this project. The students desirous of using this facility are directed to contact Librarian/ Assistant Librarian along with their e-mail IDs. Seven computers with broadband internet access and N-List facility have already been installed in the college library for the benefit of the students. More computers can also be arranged based on the use and requirement. Seven computers have already been installed in the college library for the use of students.

There are over 32,000 books in the College library, pertaining to all the disciplines taught in the College. Out of this number, 26,000 books are stacked in General Section and 6,000 are in the Book Bank. College also has a regular subscription of nearly 60 newspapers (Hindi and English), 35 magazines and journals and 3 Computer and Electronics periodicals for the benefit of students and teachers. All the students are directed to adhere to the following library rules strictly;

The resident scholars of the College are well looked after by the warden of the Hostel, Prof. Rajesh Azad residing in the hostel himself. Hostel is located across the road only. Principal is also residing in the college campus and visit the hostel quit often. The Hostel provides mess facility throughout the session. At present , hostel accommodation is available for students 100 boy students only in New Boys Hostel.

These hostels are primarily for SC/ST boy students. Hence, first allotment will be made to SC/ST boy students. Remaining vacant accommodation will be allotted to other boy students on the basis of merit. The Principal reserves all rights to admit students to the College hostel.

The students who apply for hostel accommodation must adhere to the following rules and instructions:

1. A student can apply for the hostel accommodation, from 1st July onward, after he is admitted to the College.
2. Admission forms for hostel accommodation are available in the College office with the

3. The recommendation of the Warden is necessary for admission to the hostel.
4. A failed student shall not be admitted to the College hostel.
5. The room will be allotted on a due date by the authorities.
6. The residents of the hostel are not permitted to change the room allotted to them without prior permission of the warden.
7. Fresh admission to the hostel will have to be sought in every academic year.
8. Every boarder shall have to abide by the time-schedule for the hostel as laid down from time to time.
9. No guest can stay in the hostel.
10. The general discipline requirements of the College shall be applicable to boarders as well.
11. Any other rules and regulations as may be deemed necessary by the Principal according to the circumstances are to be observed by the resident scholars.
12. All the rules for the hostel students as mentioned in chapter XXVIII of the H.P.U. Ordinance are applicable to them on concerned basis.

Joining of Mess is compulsory for all the students during stay in the Hostel.

If any student is found involved in ragging in any form whatsoever will be punished appropriately which may include:-

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- 1 It is mandatory for every student to maintain strict discipline on the College campus as well as outside the College.
 - 2 Any act performed by the student that amounts to indiscipline will be dealt with strictly.
 - 3 **All the students are directed to read the notices thoroughly which are displayed exclusively on the College notice board every day, and do the needful accordingly.**
 - 4 Teasing girl students in any manner whatsoever is an offence punishable under the law. Hence, students are advised not to indulge in such kind of activities; otherwise they would face strict legal action.
 - 5 Scribbling/writing anything on the black-board, on furniture and walls etc. is a part of indiscipline.
 - 6 To remove or break the furniture, window panes, to pluck flowers, to remove notices, etc. is also a part of indiscipline.
 - 7 The following acts also tantamount to indiscipline: to hold any meeting/function/party and to take any photographs in the premises of the College without prior permission of the Principal.
 - 8 Students should not tamper with the electrical fittings, water fittings etc. in the class-rooms, hostel and on the College campus.
 - 9 Using foul language with any student, teacher or any other employee of the College shall be viewed seriously.

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1. All the students are instructed hereby that mobile should not become nuisance to anyone.
 2. Volume should always be set low and music is not permitted to be played inside the college campus.
 3. It is permitted to meet the emergency only.
 4. **It should be switched off whenever one is inside the classroom.**
 5. Mobile will be seized immediately if there is any kind of complaint against mobile holder.
 6. **All the Professors have been directed to seize the mobile if any one is found playing music inside the college campus.**

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1. Identity card is the most important document of the college student, because it is the only identification for anyone to establish that one is the student of this college. And college authority/ administration recognize its students through Identity card only.
 2. Any kind of transaction between students and college is entertained only after production of Identity card. If student has to deal with any kind of work related with examination, library, collection/ inspection of any kind of document such alike one has to produce his/ her Identity card first in order to establish that the concerned student is the same.
 3. **Students are not permitted to replace his/ her photograph pasted on the Identity card on any reason whatsoever.**
 4. If Identity card is lost, one has to file F.I.R. in order to get a duplicate Identity card issued.
 5. In event of inspection of Identity card during surprise check or may be any reason, if any student is found without Identity card he/ she will be handed over to the police or as the situation may demand. Students without Identity card are deemed as outsider.
 6. In case, your Identity card gets misplaced, misused by anti-social elements you shall be held responsible for his/ her deeds. It is your personal responsibility to keep your Identity card in safe custody.

- a) True education aims at holistic and integrated development of an individual's personality including intellectual, physical, emotional, moral and ethical aspects in search of truth.
- b) It should transform him/her into an ideal citizen and a national asset. It should enable him/her to contribute significantly to the process of nation building and to the development of a harmonious society.
- c) In view of the overarching importance of education, every one must have a right for uninterrupted education in an academic institution.
- d) To help in fulfilling the obligations of the UGC with regard to effective teaching days as prescribed from time to time and to ensure the implementation of UGC guidelines and rules and regulations as provided in the Universities Act Statutes and Ordinances with regard to attendance requirements, academic and examination schedules, etc.
- e) Since students are the central focus of any educational system/institution, their participation in its activities is undoubtedly essential within the overall perspective as stated above.

The following terms used hereunder shall mean, unless the context otherwise so requires, as :

- a) "College" means as institution affiliated to or maintained by the University and recognized by the H.P. Government.
- b) "Students" means any person on the rolls of a college undertaking the course of study on regular and full time basis.
- c) "Association" means College Students' Central Association (CSCA).
- d) "Principal Advisor" means Principal of the College.
- e) "Teacher Advisor" means the teacher(s) nominated by the Principal.
- f) "Class" does not mean a section of a class, but it would mean to constitute all students admitted separately in B.A. I/B,Sc./B.Com.-I/BBA-I/BCA-I/BTA-I and similarly those admitted in second and third years. For postgraduate subjects, "class" will mean to constitute students admitted in a subject, e.g. in M.A. English, Economics, Geology, Hindi, History, and so on.
- g) "Misconduct" shall mean if a student is guilty of all or any of the following i.e. he/she :-
 - i) is expelled from the College/University/educational institution;
 - ii) involved in non-bailable offence;
 - iii) disqualified on account of use of unfair means in an examination;
 - iv) indulges in acts of intimidation/threats or creates a fear psychosis;
 - v) damages the property of any college, the University, an educational institution or any public property;
 - vi) prevents any official/person from performing his/her normal duties or assault on College/University teacher/official;
 - vii) brings bad name to the College/University by his/her conduct on or outside the Campus;
 - viii) disrupts classes on the College/University Campus or in any other educational institution;
 - ix) indulges in ragging/eve teasing;
 - x) is a defaulter of College/University dues/fines/mess charges, etc.;
 - xi) is found guilty by the Principal/Committee constituted by the Principal of violation of the rules regulations, notifications issued from time to time etc. by the authorities;
 - xii) violates code of conduct as laid down under Section XI i.e. "Code of Conduct".

- i) To ensure the maintenance of proper academic atmosphere and orderliness amongst the students.
- ii) To promote corporate, social and cultural life of students and to train them in their duties, responsibilities and rights of citizenship.
- iii) To promote opportunities for the development of character, leadership, discipline and spirit of service among students.
- iv) To coordinate and integrate the activities of various committees/societies/clubs in the College.

- v) To help in the organization of academic/cultural and sports activities in the College/University.
 - vi) To help in improving the living conditions in hostels, implementation of hostel discipline and rules, framed from time to time to create conducive academic atmosphere free of violence and fear psychosis.
-
- a) The Principal of the College and Five Teachers to be nominated by the Principal.
 - b) Four office bearers, i.e. President, Vice-President, Secretary and Joint Secretary.
 - c) Elected representative of the various classes. A class having 200 students or less on its rolls will have one representative. If a class has more than 200 students, then it will have one more representative for every 300 students or part thereof, but the total number of representatives in any class will not be more than four.
 - d) Three representatives to be nominated by the Principal of the College from amongst the students admitted to the class with the highest percentage of marks secured in the qualifying examination/examination of the previous class.
 - e) Two representative to be nominated by the Principal from amongst the office bearers of the societies/clubs/committees.
 - f) Two representatives to be nominated by the Principal from amongst the outstanding sports or represented in inter- varsity sports, or is playing member of a winning/runner-up team in University Championship.
 - g) Two representatives to be nominated by the Principal from amongst the outstanding students excelling in cultural and co-curricular activities, i.e. from amongst those who have represented in inter-varsity cultural meet, in case of individual performance, he/she has obtained I, II or III rank in inter-college competition, or is a member of the team in inter-College competition.
 - h) One representative from amongst the student editors of the college magazine to be nominated by the Principal.
 - i) One best NCC cadet of the college to be nominated by the Principal.
 - j) One best NSS volunteer of the college to be nominated by the Principal.

'Voter', means any student between the age limit of 17 to 22 years in case of Under Graduate classes and upto 25 years in case of PG classes as on 31st July of the every year.

The entire process of elections, commencing from the date of filing of nomination papers to the date of declaration of results, including the campaign period, should not exceed 10 days.

The election be held on a yearly basis and that the same should be held between 6 to 8 weeks from the date of commencement of the academic session.

Every student voter between the age limit of 17 to 22 years in case of boys and girls in case of Under Graduate classes as on 31st July every year shall be eligible to contest the election of the office bearers as well as Class Representative of the College Students Central Association.

The candidate should in no event have any academic arrear i.e. compartment/re-appear/failed in the preceding year/semester of contesting the election.

The candidate should have attained the minimum percentage of attendance as prescribed by the University or 75% attendance, whichever is higher.

The candidate shall have one opportunity to contest for the post of office bearer, and two opportunities to contest for the post of an executive member.

The candidate shall not have a previous criminal record, that is to say he/she should not have been tried and/or convicted of any criminal offence or misdemeanor. The candidate shall also not have been subject to any disciplinary action by the University/College authorities.

The candidate must be a regular, full time student of the College/University and should not be a distance/proximate education student. That is to say that all eligible candidates must be enrolled in a full time course, the course duration being at least one year.

Provided that the candidate contesting the election is not holding any paid job except in case of an Evening College.

Provided further that a student who has been punished for a misconduct or violates election code shall not be eligible to contest the election.

The Principal will be the Principal Advisor of the College Students Central Association and its Executive Committee. Five teachers nominated by the Principal will be the members of the Executive Committee. In addition, the Executive Committee shall consist of:

- i) President
- ii) Vice-President
- iii) Secretary
- iv) Joint Secretary
- v) Five members to be elected from amongst class representatives mentioned in clause IV (c)
- vi) Five members to be elected from amongst the representative mentioned in clauses IV (d) to IV (i)

- a) President : The President will coordinate the meeting of the Executive Committee as well as meetings of the CSCA.
- b) Vice-President : The Vice-President shall perform all the duties of the President in the latter's absence. He will automatically become the officiating President if the President resigns or is unable to discharge his duties for the rest of the term.
- c) Secretary : The secretary will assist the President in performance of his duties
- d) Joint-Secretary : The Joint-Secretary will perform all the duties of Secretary in latter's absence. He will automatically become the officiating Secretary if Secretary resigns or is unable to discharge his duties for the rest of the term.

Note: In the event of the office of any major post of office bearers falling vacant within two months of elections, re-elections should be conducted; otherwise the Vice-President may be promoted to the post of President and Joint Secretary to the post Secretary, as the case may be.

The maximum permitted election related expenditure per candidate shall be Rs. 5000/-.

Each candidate shall, within two weeks of the declaration of the result, submit complete and certified account (to be certified by the candidates) to the College/University authorities. The College/University shall publish such audited accounts within 2 days of submission of such accounts, through a suitable medium so that any member of the student body may freely examine the same.

The election of the candidate will be nullified in the event of any non-compliance or in the event of any excessive expenditure.

With the view to prevent the inflow of funds from political parties into the student election process, the candidates are specially barred from utilizing funds from any other sources than voluntary contributions from the students body.

The elections of the office bearers and Class Representatives shall be held in all the Classes on the date to be notified by the Registrar as approved by the Vice-Chancellor. The election process will be completed in a period of 10 days during second week of August every year.

Elections of the Class Representatives and office bearers will be conducted by the Principal in cooperation with the Teachers/Official of the College. The Principal will be the Returning Officer.

- a) During election of the SCA, the following code of conduct shall have to be observed by the student bodies, contestants and their supporters :
 1. No candidate shall indulge in, nor shall abet, any activity, which may aggravate existing difference or create mutual hatred or cause tension between different castes and communities, religious or linguistic, or between any groups(s) of students.
 2. Criticism of other candidates, when made, shall be confined to their policies and programs, past record and work. Candidates shall refrain from criticism of all aspects of private life, not connected with the public activities of the other candidates or supporters of such other candidates. Criticism of other candidates, or their supporters based on unverified allegations or distortion shall be avoided.

3. There shall be no appeal to caste or communal feelings for securing votes. Places of worship, within or outside the campus shall not be used for election propaganda.
4. All candidates shall be prohibited from indulging or abetting, all activities which are considered to be "corrupt practices" and offences, such as bringing of voters, intimidation of voters, impersonation of voters canvassing or the use of propaganda with 100 meters of polling stations, holding public meetings during the period of 24 hours ending with the time fixed for the close of the poll, and the transport and conveyance of voters to and from polling station.
5. No candidate shall be permitted to make use of printed posters, printed pamphlets, or any other printed material for the purpose of canvassing. Candidates may only utilize hand-made posters for the purpose of canvassing, provided that such hand-made poster are procured within the expenditure limit set out herein above.
6. Candidates may only utilize hand-made posters at certain places in the campus, which shall be notified in advance by the College/University Authority.
7. No candidate shall be permitted to carry out processions or public meetings, or in any way canvass or distribute propaganda outside the University/College Campus.
8. No candidate shall, nor shall his/her supporters, deface or cause any destruction to any property of the University/College campus, for any purpose whatsoever. All candidates shall be held jointly and severally liable for any destruction/defacing of any University/College property.
9. During the election period the candidates may hold processions and/or public meetings, provided that such processions and/or public meetings do not, in any manner, disturb the classes and other academic and co-curricular activities of the College/University. Further, such procession / public meeting may not be held without the prior written permission of the College/University Authorities.
10. The use of loudspeakers, vehicles and animals for the purpose of canvassing shall be prohibited.
11. On the day of polling, student organization and candidates shall –
 - i) co-operate with the officers on election duty to ensure peaceful and orderly polling and complete freedom to the voters to exercise their franchise without being subjected to any annoyance or obstruction;
 - ii) not serve or distribute any eatables, or other solid and liquid consumables, except water on polling day;
 - iii) not involve in any kind of propaganda on the polling day.
12. Excepting the voters, no one without a valid pass/letter of authority from the election commission or from the College/University authorities shall enter the polling booths.
13. The election commission/College/University authorities shall appoint impartial observers. In the case of deemed universities and self-financing institutions, government servants may be appointed as deserves. If the candidates have any specific complaint or problem regarding the conduct of the elections they may bring the same to the notice of the observer. Observers shall also be appointed to oversee the process of nomination of students in institutions that are following the nominations model of student representation.
14. All candidates shall be jointly responsible for ensuring the cleaning up of the polling area within 48 hours of the conclusion of polling.
15. Any contravention of any of the above recommendations may make the candidate liable to be stripped of his candidature, or his elected post, as the case may be. The election commission/college/university authorities may also take appropriate disciplinary action against such a violator.
16. In addition to the above-mentioned code of conduct, certain provisions of the Indian penal Code, 1860 (Section 153-A and Chapter IX –A "Offences Relating to Election"), will be applicable to student elections.
 - a) The CSCA will meet at least once in every three months (the first quarter starting from the beginning of the Academic Session).
 - b) The ordinary meetings may be convened by the President by giving at least one week's notice.
 - c) One-third of the total student membership shall form the quorum.
 - d) A special meeting for specific purpose can be requisitioned by at least one-third of the total student members through a notice in writing under their signatures, by giving at least 15 days notice.
 - e) If the situation so demands, the Principal Advisor may call an emergency meeting.
 - f) No confidence motion against any of the members of the Executive Committee can be moved only if one –third members of CSCA are in favour of the motion and give 15 days notice in writing. The motion after discussion will be put to vote. If two-third student members are in favour of the 'No-Confidence Motion', it shall be treated as carried.
 - g) The meetings of the Executive Committee as well as of the CSCA shall be presided over by the Principal Advisor.

1. There shall be a Grievances Redressal Cell with the Dean Students Welfare/teacher in charge of Student affairs, as its Chairman. In addition, one senior faculty member, one senior administrative officer and two final year students- one boy and one girl (till the election results declared, students can be nominated on the basis of merit and / or participation in the co-curricular activities in the previous year). The grievance cell shall be mandated with the Redressal of election-related grievance, including, but not limited to breaches of the code of conduct of elections and complaints relating to election-related expenditure. This cell would be the regular unit of the institution.
2. In pursuit of its duties, the grievance cell may prosecute violators of any aspect of the code of conduct or the rulings of the grievance cell. The grievance cell shall serve as the court of original jurisdiction. The institutional head shall have appellate jurisdiction over issues of law and fact in all cases or controversies arising out of the conduct of the elections, which the grievance cell has issued a final decision. Upon review, the institutional head may revoke or modify the sanctions imposed by the grievance cell.
3. In carrying out the duties of the office, the Grievance Cell shall conduct proceedings and hearing necessary to fulfill those duties. In executing those duties they shall have the authority :
 - I) to issue a writ of subpoena to compel candidates, agenda, and workers, and to request students to appear and give testimony, as well as produce necessary records; and
 - II) to inspect the financial reports of any candidate and make these records available for public scrutiny upon request.
4. Members of the Grievance Cell are prohibited from filing complaints. Any other student may file a complaint with the Grievance Cell, within a period of 3 weeks from the date of declaration of results. All complaints must be filed under the name of the student filing the complaint. The Grievance Cell shall act on all complaints within 24 hours after they are received by either dismissing them or calling a hearing.
5. The Grievance Cell may dismiss a complaint if :-
 - i) the complaint was notified within the time frame prescribed in the recommendations referred to above;
 - ii) the complaint fails to state a cause of action for which relief may be granted.
 - iii) The complainant has not and / or likely will not suffer injury or damage.
6. If a complaint is not dismissed, then a hearing must be held. The Grievance Cell shall inform, in writing, or via e-mail, the complaining party and individuals or groups named in the complaint of the time and place of the hearing. The parties are not considered notified until they have received a copy of the complaint.
7. The hearing shall be held at the earliest possible time, but not later than twenty-four (24) hours after receipt of the notice described above, unless all parties agree to waive the 24 – hours time constraint.
8. At the time, notice of hearing is issued, the Grievance, Cell, by majority vote, may issue a temporary restraining order, if it is of the opinion that such an action is necessary to prevent undue or adverse effects on any individual or entity. Any restraining order, once issued, will remain in effect until a decision of the Grievance Cell is announced after the hearing or until rescinded by the Grievance Cell.
9. All Grievance Cell hearing, proceedings, and meetings must be open to the public.
10. All parties of the Grievance Cell shall present themselves at the hearing, may be accompanied by any other student from which they can receive counsel, and have the option to be represented by that counsel.
11. For any hearing, a majority of sitting Grievance Cell members must be present along with the Chairperson of the Grievance Cell. In the absence of the Chair, the responsibility to preside shall fall to an Grievance Cell member designated by the Chair.
12. The Grievance Cell determining the format for the hearing must require that both the complaining and responding parties appear in person before the board to discuss the issues through a complaint, answered, rebuttal, and rejoinder format. The purpose of the hearing is to gather the information necessary to make a decision, order, or ruling that will resolve an election dispute. To effectuate this purpose, the following rules should prevail at all hearings :-
 - * Complaining parties shall be allowed no more than two witnesses, however, the Grievance Cell may call witnesses as required. If said witnesses are unable to appear at the hearing, signed affidavits may be submitted to the Grievance Cell chair for the purpose of testifying by proxy.
 - * All questions and discussion by the parties in dispute shall be directed to the Grievance Cell.
 - * There shall be no direct or cross-examination of any party or witness by complaining or responding parties during hearings.
 - * Reasonable time limits may be set by the Grievance Cell provided they give fair and equal treatment to both sides.
 - * The complaining party shall bear the burden of proof.
 - * Decisions order and rulings of the Grievance Cell must be concurred to by a majority of the Grievance Cell and shall be announced as soon as possible after the hearing. The Grievance Cell shall issue a written opinion must set forth the findings of fact by the Grievance Cell and the conclusions of law in support of it. Written opinions shall set a

The basic purpose of education is to create skill and knowledge and awareness of our glorious national heritage and the achievements of human civilization, possessing a basic scientific outlook and commitment to the ideals of patriotism, democracy, secularism, socialism and peace, and the principles enunciated in the preamble to our constitution.

Higher education has to produce leaders of society and economy in all areas of manifold activities with a commitment to the aforesaid ideals.

Higher education should strive for academic excellence, and progress of arts and science. Education, research and extension should be conducted in conformity with our national needs and priorities and ensure that our best talents make befitting contribution to international endeavour on societal needs.

Teachers should enjoy full civic and political rights of our democratic country. Teachers have a right to adequate emoluments social position, just conditions of service, professional independence and adequate social insurance.

I. TEACHERS AND THEIR RESPONSIBILITIES

Whoever adopts teaching as a professional assumes the obligation to conduct himself in accordance with the ideas of the profession. A teacher is constantly under the scrutiny of his students and the society at large. Therefore, every teacher should see that there is no incompatibility between his precepts and practice. The national ideals of education which have already been set forth and which he/she should seek to inculcate among students must be his/her own ideals. The profession further requires that the teachers should be calm, patient and communicative by temperament and amiable in disposition.

- (i) Adhere to a responsible pattern of conduct and demeanour expected of them by the community;
- (ii) Manage their private affairs in a manner consistent with the dignity of the profession;
- (iii) Seek to make professional growth continuous through study and research;
- (iv) Express free and frank opinion by participation at profession meeting; seminars, conferences etc. towards the contribution of knowledge.
- (v) Maintain active membership of professional organizations and strive to improve education and profession through them;
- (vi) Perform their duties in the form of teaching, tutorial, practical and seminar work conscientiously and with dedication.
- (vii) Co-operate and assist in carrying out functions relating to the educational responsibilities of the college and the University such as: assisting in appraising applications for admission, advising and counselling students as well as assisting in the conduct of University and college examination including supervision, invigilation and evaluations; and
- (viii) Participate in extension, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities including community service.

Teachers Should

- (i) Respect the right and dignity of the student in expressing his/her opinion;
- (ii) Deal justly and impartially with students regardless of their religion, caste, political, economic, social and physical characteristics;
- (iii) Recognize the difference in aptitude and capabilities among students and strive to meet their individual needs;
- (iv) Encourage students to improve their attainments, develop their personalities and at the same time contribute to community welfare;
- (v) Inculcate among students scientific outlook and respect for physical labour and ideals of democracy, patriotism and peace.
- (vi) Be affectionate to the students and not behave in a vindictive manner towards any of them for any reasons;
- (vii) Pay attention to only the attainment of the student in the assessment of merit;
- (viii) Make themselves available to the students even beyond their class hours and help and guide students without any remuneration or reward;
- (ix) Aid students to develop an understanding of our national heritage and national goals and
- (x) Refrain from inciting students against other students, colleagues or administration.

Teachers should

- (i) Treat other members of the profession in the same manner as they themselves wish to be treated;
- (ii) Speak respectfully of other teachers and render assistance for professional betterment;
- (iii) Refrain from lodging unsubstantiated allegations against colleagues to higher authorities;
- (iv) Refrain from allowing considerations of caste, creed religion, race or sex in their professional endeavour.

Teachers Should

- (i) Discharge their professional responsibilities according to the existing rules and adhere to procedures and methods consistent with their profession in initiating steps through their own institutional bodies and/or professional organization for change of any such rule detrimental to the professional interest;
- (ii) Refrain from undertaking any other employment and commitment including private tuition and coaching classes which are likely to interfere with their professional responsibilities;
- (iii) Co-operate in the formula of policies of the institutions by accepting various offices and discharge responsibilities which such offices may demand;
- (iv) Co-operate through their organizations in the formulation of policies of the other institutions and accept offices;
- (v) Co-operate with the authorities for the betterment of the institutions keeping in view the interest and in conformity with dignity of the professions;
- (viii) Refrain from availing themselves of leave except on un-avoidable ground and as far as practicable with prior intimation, keeping in view their particular responsibility for completion for academic schedule.

- (i) Teachers should treat the non-teaching staff as colleagues and equal partners in a cooperative undertaking, within every educational institution;
- (ii) Teachers should help in the function of joint staff councils covering both teachers and the non-teaching staff.

- (i) Teachers should try to see through teachers' bodies and organizations that institutions maintain contact with the guardians of their students, send reports of their performance to the guardians whenever necessary and meet the guardians in meetings convened for the purpose for mutual exchange of ideas and for the benefit to the institution.

Teachers should

- (i) Recognize that education is a public service and strive to keep the public informed of the educational programmes which are being provided;
- (ii) Work to improve education in the community and strengthen the community's moral and intellectual life;
- (iii) Be aware of social problems and take part in such activities as would be conducive to the progress of society and hence the country as a whole;
- (iv) Perform the duties of citizenship, participate in community activities and shoulder responsibilities of public offices;
- (v) Refrain from taking part in or subscribing to or assisting in any way activities which tend to promote feeling of hatred or enmity among different communities, religions or linguistic groups but actively work for national integration.
